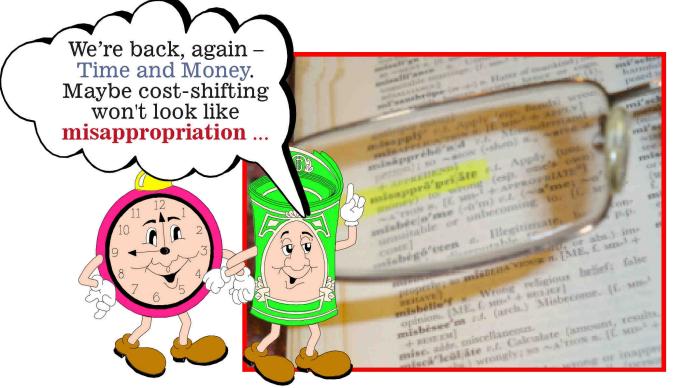
Laguna Honda Hospital's Patient Gift Fund:

Are Charitable Contributions Intended for Patients, Being Cost-Shifted to Pay for Hospital Operating Costs?

Figure 1: Total Gift Fund Expenses

- A marked rise in Patient Gift Fund expenses began in July 2005, and continued in in 2008 and again in 2009.

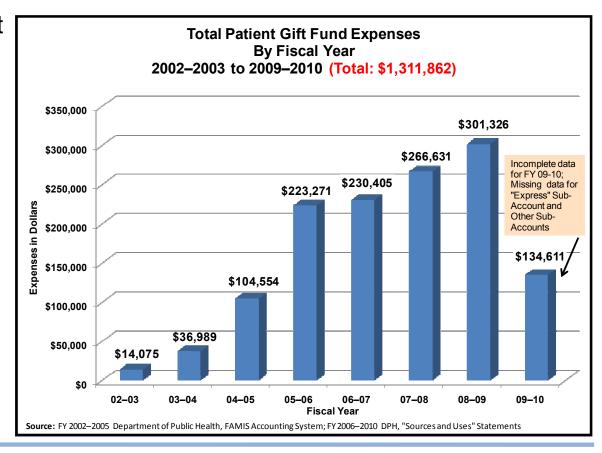


Figure 2: Cash Balance by Fiscal Year End

- At the same time, the Gift Fund cash balances dropped each year (see Figure 2).
- The main cause was
 Cost-Shifting of hospital
 operational expenses
 to the Patient Gift Fund.

- The cash balance in the Patient Gift Fund was steadily drained.
- The public records obtained did not account for the loss of \$745,000 from the gift fund assets between December 2004 and 2005; this occurred within the first eight months of John Kanaley's starting date as LHH's Executive Administrator.
- The inverse relationship between Figures 1 and 2 is striking.

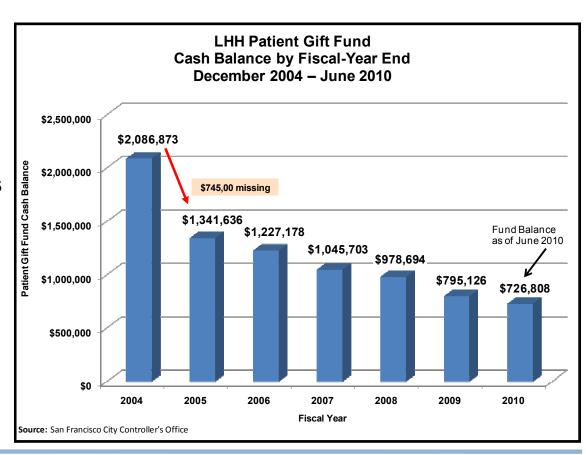


Figure 3: Staff Amenities — Summary

- Starting in July 2005, staff perquisites ("perks") became routine and averaged
 \$6,000 per year.

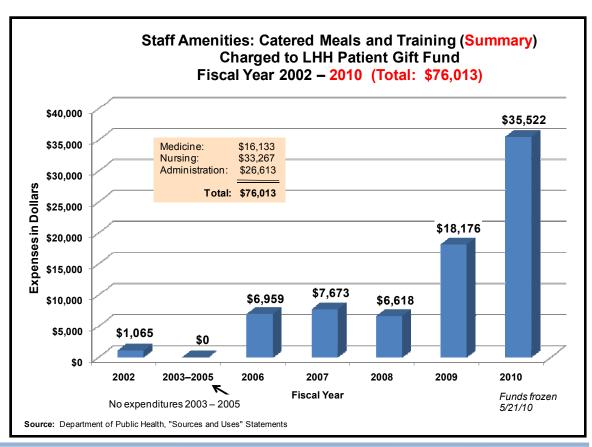


Figure 4: Staff Amenities — Details

- They rose exponentially in 2009 after Mivic Hirose became LHH's Executive Administrator, as shown in Figures 3 and 4.

The staff perks were paid by the Patient Gift Fund through newly created "staff sub-accounts" named "Administration Education" (HLADMI), "Nursing Education"

(HLNURS), and "Physician Education" (HLMEDI).

 The Nursing Education sub-account accounted for 60.6% of the increased spending in 2009 (shown in Figure 3), and 40.4% of the increased spending in 2010.

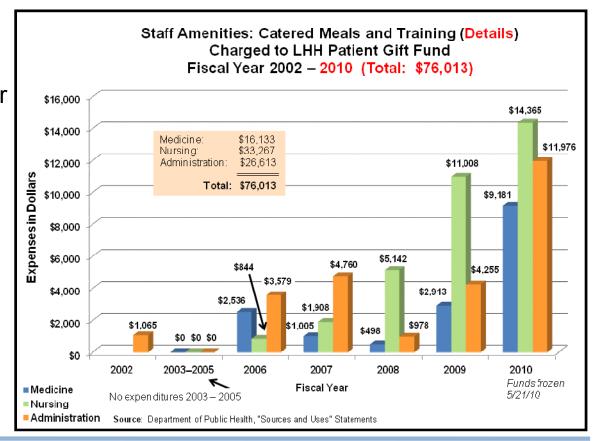


Table 1: Staff Perquisites Charged to Patient Gift Fund

- Although some of the funds spent from these staff accounts had been specifically donated for staff development, most were not, as Table 1 illustrates.
- Legitimate expenditures of educational grants to Nursing's HLNSEL account, and those to Medicine's HLPHEP and HLPEDP accounts were not included in the analysis, nor are they challenged.

Figure 5: Patient Activities and Amenities

- From 2001 to 2007, the Patient Gift Fund expended an average of \$17,392 per year for extra patient activities and amenities.
- Gift Fund expenses for patient activities and amenities surged to \$94,570 per year in 2008.
- These patient amenity expenses skyrocketed to \$118,252 in 2009; this suggests massive costshifting, since by 2008. LHH's patient census had plummeted by 20%.

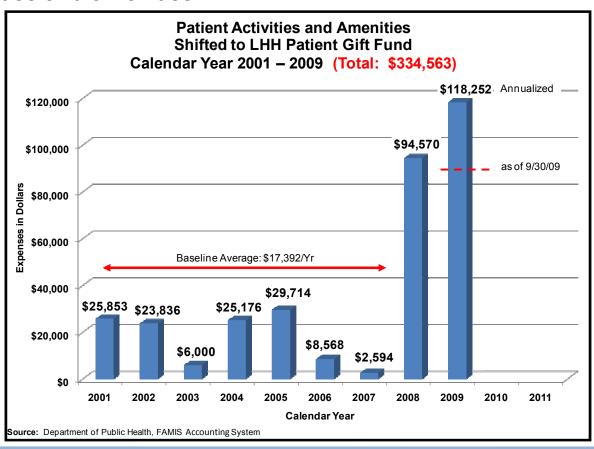


Figure 6: Patient Transportation Costs

- Recreational bus trips and specialized patient transportation services paid from the Patient Gift Fund averaged \$4,168 per year from 2001 through 2004.
- In 2005 they surged to \$39,646, and in 2008 they climbed to \$65,848.
- The patient transportation costs were shifted from the hospital's Activity Therapy Department budget, and onto the Patient Gift Fund, draining \$197,342 from the fund.`

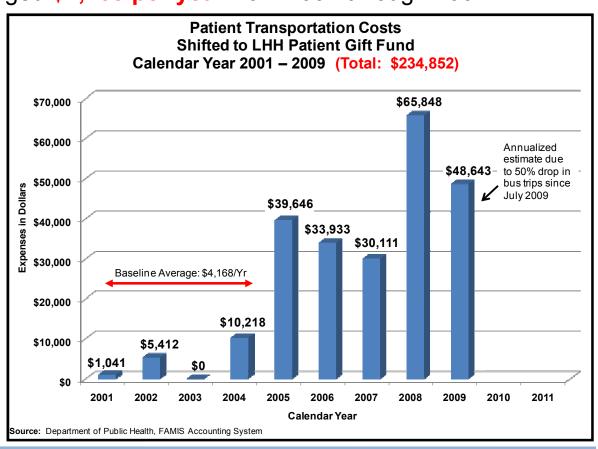


Figure 7: Dietary Department Catering Costs

- Cost shifting of LHH's Dietary Department catering services to the Patient Gift Fund total \$175,162.
- The catering costs were <u>not</u> charged to the Patient Gift Fund prior to November 2004:

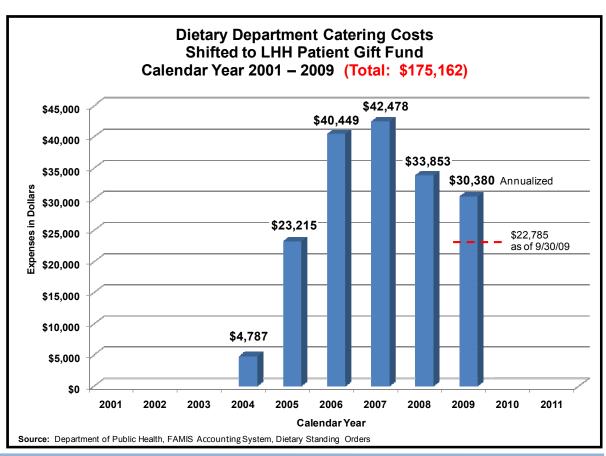


Table 2: Cost Shifting From "Operations Budget" to Patient Gift Fund

- A marked rise in Patient Gift Fund expenses occurred in July 2005, again in 2008, and yet again in 2009.
- At the same time, the Gift Fund cash balances dropped each year (see Figures 1 and 2).
- The main cause was Cost-Shifting of hospital operational expenses onto the Patient Gift Fund.
- Cost shifting may account for \$576,663 of the depleted Patient Gift Fund balances.
- Between the \$576,663

 in cost-shifted expenses
 and the unexplained
 \$745,00 went missing
 in 2005, the gift fund has
 been depleted by at least \$1.3 million

Figure 8: Combined Costs

 Although <u>not</u> included in the two cost-shifting reports doctors Kerr and Rivero submitted to the Health Commission, the Civil Grand Jury, and the City's

Whistleblower Program on August 20 and September 1, respectively, the combined costs for these four areas of spending account for \$785,068 since 2001, without correcting for "baseline" annual averages prior to 2004.

• The **spikes** in 2005 and 2008 are notable.

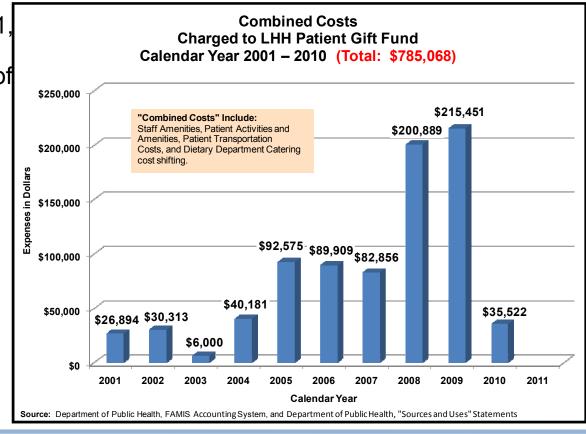


Figure 9: Volunteers Inc.'s Donations to LHH Since FY 2004–2005 Have Dropped

 Although also <u>not</u> included in the two cost-shifting reports doctors Kerr and Rivero submitted to the Health Commission, the Civil Grand Jury, and the City's

Whistleblower Program on August 20 and September 1, respectively, the combined donations from private donations to the Patient Gift Fund and grants to LHH from Volunteers Inc. plummeted sharply in FY 2007–2008 — at the same time cost-shifting went up dramatically.

 The combined giving in FY 08–09 has shrunk below giving in FY 04–05.
